

## Hello? Hello!



**Objective:** By the end of this lesson, your students should have some familiarity with common terminology related to greetings and small talk conversations.

Grade Span: OSY

Subjects: ESL, Greetings, and Small Talk

Why study this? Greetings are the foundation of social interactions.



They serve as the first impression we make on others and set the tone for further communication.
Whether it's a simple "hello" or a warm handshake, greetings play a crucial role in building strong relationships.

**Teacher Tip:** Build reading, writing, listening, and speaking opportunities into every lesson. OSY students often benefit from being offered reading, writing, listening, and speaking challenges, and work at the equivalent of the last grade level they were in. They may have surpassed this level since then, but it's a good place to start.

Lesson Intro: Watch this! Begin the discussion

about meeting new people, family relationships, and language barriers (and build background knowledge) by watching <u>a read-aloud</u> of *Drawn Together*.

**Lesson:** Start with the <u>Personal Information and Common English Phrases</u> lessons in English in Minutes Book One.

Extensions: Expand the lesson and add depth with resources such as the following.

Many of our students say they want to practice their conversation skills. You can use these <u>Top 5 Small talk ESL</u> <u>activities</u> to help them do just that and to work on speaking more fluently at the same time.



Explore the <u>Personal Information</u>, <u>Family Members</u>, and <u>Leisure Activities</u> pages of the <u>Interactive Picture</u> <u>Dictionary</u>. Students can also use others, depending on their interests.

Striking up (=starting) conversations and keeping them going is important to good communication. Have students practice with <a href="Basic English "Introductions"">Basic English "Introductions"</a> from Randall's Listening Lab. Learning how to say hello (starting a conversation) and ending a conversation smoothly are very important to making friends. Students can practice with the <a href="Conversation Starters">Conversation Starters</a> activities.

Have students practice their small talk skills with the Achievery lesson Pick Your Pitch (Gr 9-12). "Can you tell me about yourself?" People will ask this question throughout their life: at interviews, at family parties, in personal essays... But how should they answer it? In this lesson, students craft their answers and practice using it in a mock interview setting.
