

## What is the Migrant Education Program?

**The Migrant Education Program** (MEP) was established in 1966 as Title 1 Part C. MEP is a program designed to provide supplemental educational services and bridge the educational gaps of the children of migrant agricultural farmworkers or fishers.

Services offered by MEP can include but are not limited to educational resources such as tutoring, assistance with high school equivalency programs, language classes, parental engagement programs, health screenings, and more!

## Who is eligible for the Migrant Education Program?

**Students may be eligible** for Migrant Education Program services if they have moved into your school district in the last three years with an agricultural farmworker or fisher or if they have moved to work in agriculture or fishing themselves.

## What is the IDRC Electronic Survey Tool?

The IDRC Electronic Survey Tool is a free and easy-to-use platform that lets you submit a referral for any potentially eligible students in under two minutes!

When a referral is submitted, the potential student's contact information is securely sent to Migrant Education Program staff living in the student's area. Anyone with the link or QR code can fill out the online form and a Migrant Education Program recruiter will contact the family shortly!

## Why should you provide a referral?

Due to their highly mobile lifestyle, Migrant children often encounter many roadblocks to their education. Migrant students often experience language barriers, social isolation, and limited access to transportation and health care resources.

The Migrant Education Program aims to help migrant students overcome the challenges they face so they may receive the same academic and educational opportunities as students who do not live such highly mobile lifestyles. By providing a referral for a potentially eligible student, you are playing an important role in helping them to receive the services they need in a timely manner.
